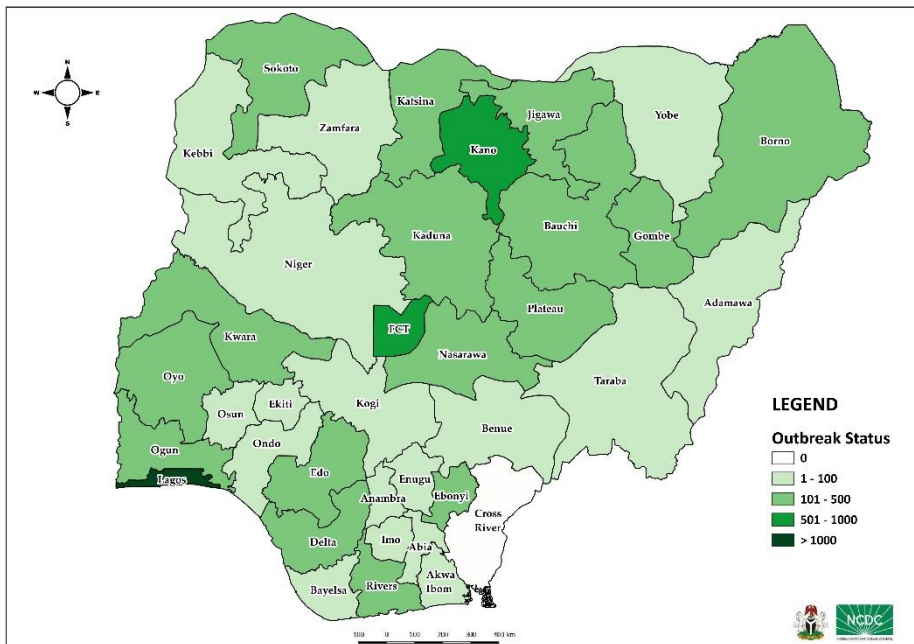
DATA AS REPORTED AND ACCURATE BY NCDC AS AT MIDNIGHT 6<sup>th</sup> JUNE 2020

### HIGHLIGHTS

- Three hundred and eighty-nine (**389**) confirmed cases were reported in the last 24 hours in twenty-three (**23**) states – Lagos (66), FCT (50), Delta (32), Oyo (31), Borno (26), Rivers (24), Ebonyi (23), Edo (23), Anambra (17), Gombe (17), Nasarawa (14), Imo (12), Kano (12), Sokoto (12), Jigawa (8), Ogun (7), Bauchi (5), Kaduna (2), Katsina (2), Kebbi (2), Ondo (2), Abia (1) and Niger (1).
- No new state recorded a confirmed COVID-19 case in the last 24 hours. The total number of states including FCT that have reported at least one confirmed case in Nigeria is still **36** (35 states + FCT).
- One hundred and thirty (**130**) cases were discharged in the last 24 hours in eleven (**11**) states – Lagos (42), Kano (33), Rivers (26), Kaduna (8), FCT (5), Delta (4), Sokoto (4), Borno (3), Bauchi (2), Osun (2) and Katsina (1).
- Nine (**9**) deaths were recorded in the last 24 hours in seven (**7**) states – Kano (2), Ogun (2), Bauchi (1), Enugu (1), Gombe (1), Katsina (1) and Rivers (1).
- Secretary to the Government of the Federation, and Chair of the Presidential Task Force on COVID-19, Boss Mustapha visited the National Reference Lab, Gaduwa as Nigeria recognises 100 days since the index case of COVID-19 in the country

Figure 2: Daily Epidemic Curve of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK23)

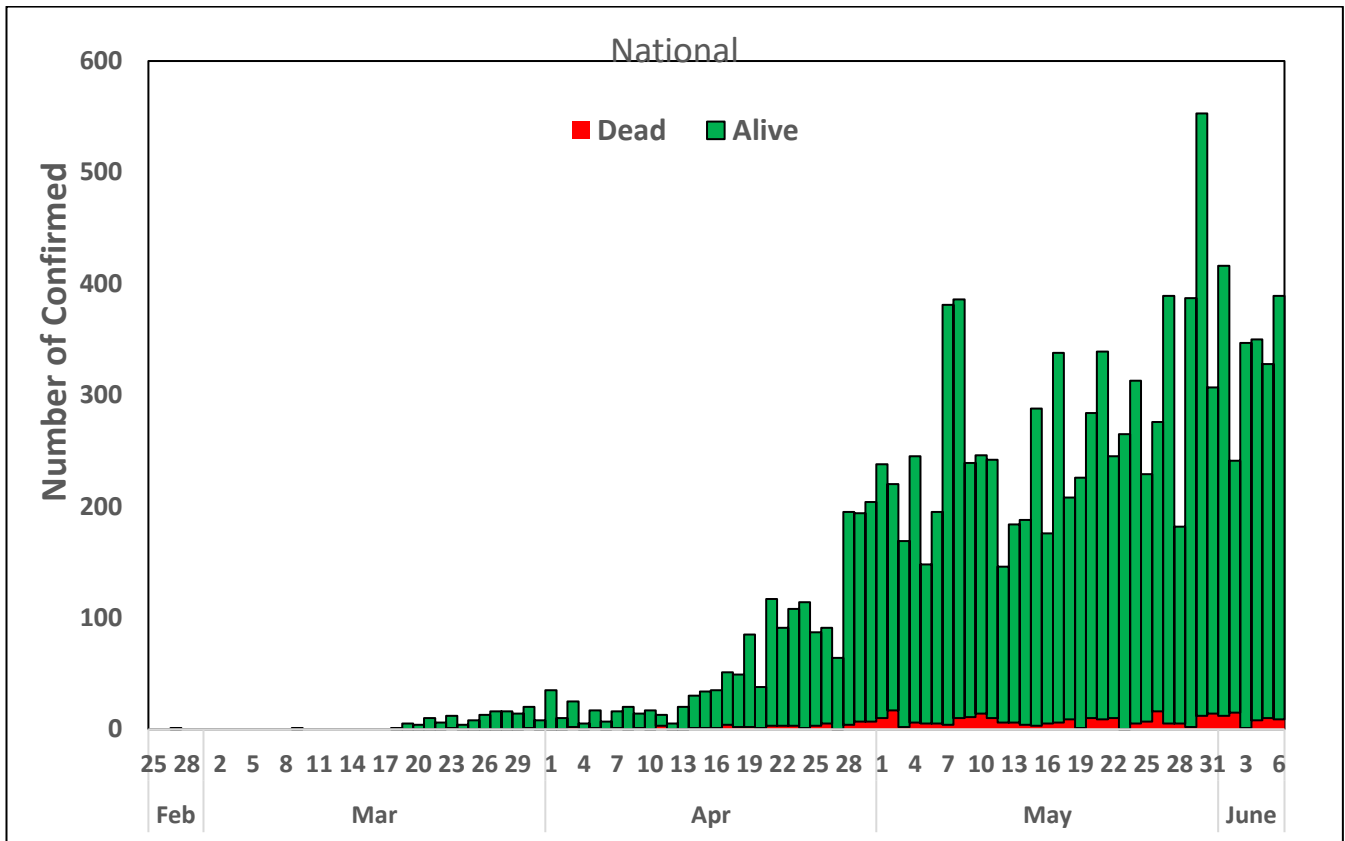
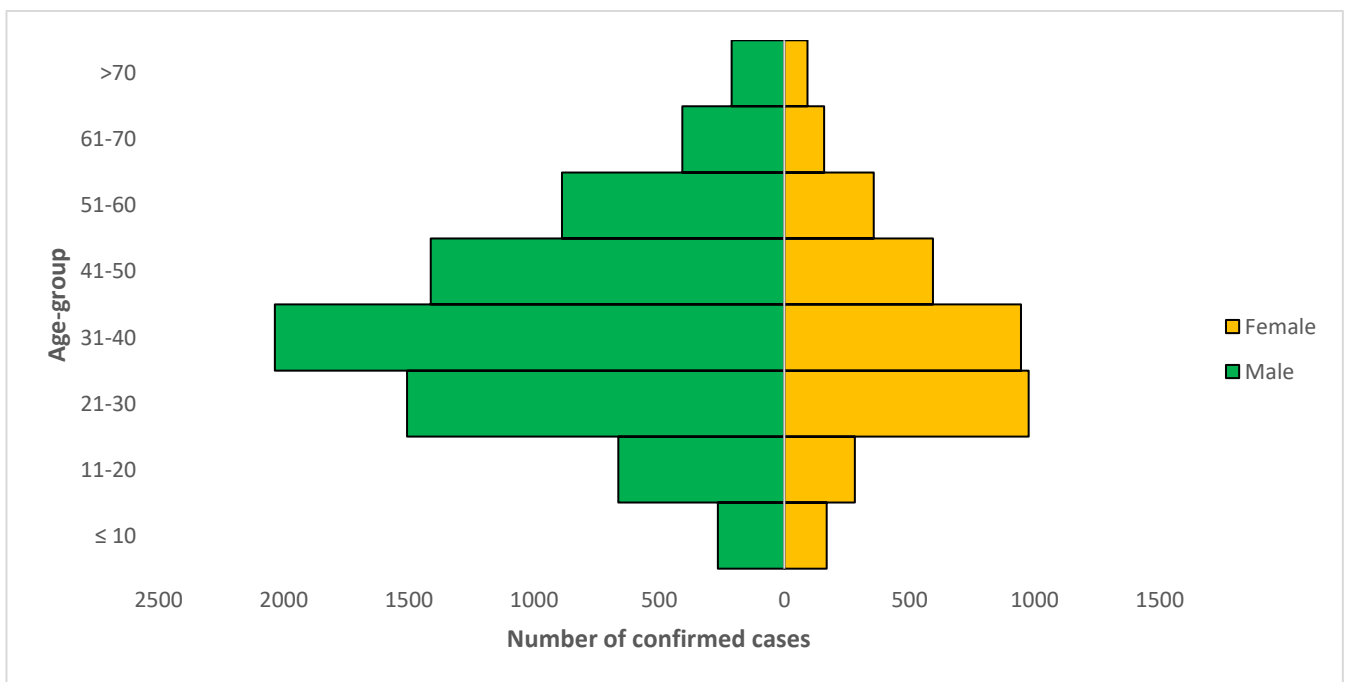


Figure 3: Age-Sex Distribution of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK23)



## PREPAREDNESS

Since the confirmation of the first case on 27<sup>th</sup> February 2020, the NCDC has released advisories and statements to help Nigerians and affected groups in particular to respond to the pandemic

- NCDC and the Department of Hospital Services (Federal Ministry of Health) have updated the [case management guidelines](#) (version 3) with reviewed changes such as the discharge criteria and medication being used for the treatment of cases
- Guidelines have been issued for the [safe transportation of remains of persons suspected or confirmed to have died of COVID-19](#)
- Information on diagnostics of the COVID-19 virus can be found in our [detailed FAQ document](#).
- To increase our testing capacity, NCDC has issued guidelines for the [integration of private labs](#).
- Guidelines for [businesses and employers](#) have been updated.
- NCDC has updated its [case definition](#) , [community case definition](#) and [case management guide](#).
- NCDC releases periodic [public health advisories](#) to Nigerians on the COVID-19 disease.
- To adhere to post-lockdown measures, NCDC has released an [advisory on the use of face masks](#), as well as information on the [Use of Cloth face masks](#) and [how to make your cloth face masks](#).

## RESPONSE

On 28<sup>th</sup> February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 – the highest emergency level in Nigeria –led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC).

- **Official visit of the PTF Chairman/Secretary to the Government of the Federation to the National Reference Laboratory (NRL) Gaduwa**
- **Intensified collation of information in States to track improvement in sample collection**
- **Ongoing optimisation of laboratories in Akwa Ibom, Ekiti, Jigawa, Ondo, and Oyo States**
- **Trained second batch of 60 journalists from print and electronic media on COVID-19 reporting and fact checking of information**
- **Completed the deployment of COVID-19 response supplies to State Ministries of Health (SMOH), treatment centres in the States and Federal teaching hospitals and Medical Centres (FMCs) in the North West**
- **Set up triage centres and supplied Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to 10 primary health centres in the three high burden Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Katsina – Katsina, Daura and Ingawa**
- **Trained 67 Security Personnel on IPC in Ebonyi**
- **Developed a comprehensive intervention plan for IPC measures at primary and secondary health care facilities in Oyo**
- **High level strategic virtual engagement with 37 State Epidemiologists on new control measures to improve the current outbreak and shared update on the progress of the proposed NCDC/World Bank support**

- Ongoing daily monitoring of 280 returnees/evacuees in Abuja
- Training of Healthcare Workers (HCWs) in hard to reach areas of Southern Borno
- Developed guidelines on safe event management
- Finalised national dialogue on schools` reopening with the education sector
- Completed onsite training on sample collection for 25 health workers in Ondo and Benue
