


Fig 1. Distribution of cases (Epi Week 37 only)

HIGHLIGHTS

- In Week 37, the number of new confirmed cases decreased to 2,647 from 3,640 reported in week 36. These were reported in 26 states and FCT (Tables 1 & 2).
- In Week 37, the number of discharged cases increased to 4,150 from 1,880 in week 36. These were reported in 23 states and FCT (Tables 1 & 3). This includes backlog and community discharges reported from Lagos State from week 36
- There were 57 deaths reported in the last one week (Tables 1 & 4).
- Cumulatively, since the outbreak began in Week **9**, 2020 there have been **201,798** cases and **2,655** deaths reported with a case fatality rate (CFR) of **1.3%** (Tables 1 & 4).
- In Week 37, the number of in-bound international travellers tested were **5,506** of which **103** were positive compared to **141** (out of **5,473** tested) in week 36.
- In Week 37, the number of out-bound international travellers tested were **8,087** of which **202** were positive compared to **233** (out of **7,922** tested) in week 36.
- Globally, the count for confirmed COVID-19 cases is **228,394,572** with **4,690,186 deaths** resulting in a case fatality rate of **2.1%**.




Figure 3: Daily epidemic curve of confirmed cases as reported per day as of 19th September 2021

AGE-GENDER BREAKDOWN




Figure 7: Chart with age and gender breakdown of cases and deaths (WK10, 2020 – WK37, 2021)

IN FOCUS: Supportive Supervision for COVID-19 in National Youth Service Corps

As Nigeria continues the response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Nigeria Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) is working with relevant ministries, departments, and agencies to institute sustainable measures. This includes activities that support the safe resumption of schools and National Youth Service Corps (NYSC).

The NYSC is a mandatory one-year programme for Nigerian university graduates during which corps members are required to spend three weeks in a designated orientation camp. Although the camps were initially closed because of the pandemic, NCDC has been supporting NYSC authorities to enable safe resumption.

The NCDC and NYSC carried out a state-wide assessment of orientation camps in all 36 States and the Federal Capital Territory to ensure adherence to COVID-19 safety protocols and infection prevention and control (IPC) measures. This activity has continued and includes training of corps members and NYSC officials on championing COVID-19 preventive measures during the service year.

In addition, approved Antigen-based Rapid Diagnostic Test (RDTs), which can be used to promptly detect COVID-19 cases in closed settings such as camps, prisons, and workplaces, are being used to test new corps members and other members of the camp community on entry. State Surveillance Officers engaged by NCDC are also working to ensure that all positive cases of COVID-19 are reported on time and that RDTs are properly accounted for.

We encourage States to make the necessary resources and facilities available to ensure that COVID-19 cases are detected early and contained to avoid further spread. The NCDC continues to support NYSC activities across the country to ensure safety and continuity of national activities.

RESPONSE

On 28th February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 which is the highest emergency level in Nigeria. This is led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC) and through the deployment of **59** Rapid Response Teams (RRT) to states. Currently, response activities include:

- Held bi-weekly engagement meeting with state teams on the ongoing response to the third wave
- Ongoing training of community volunteers in 15 states to support case finding and contact tracing
- Ongoing IPC monitoring and supervision activities in Kaduna State
- Conducted IPC refresher training for healthcare workers at the University of Uyo Teaching Hospital
- Ongoing assessment of 30 health facilities in the Federal Capital Territory (FCT) and Nasarawa State for IPC implementation in collaboration with Institute of Human Virology Nigeria (IHVN)
- Ongoing supportive supervision and assessment of the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) orientation camp activities to ensure adherence to COVID-19 protocols
- Supported Defense Reference Laboratory FCT, Sobi Hospital Kwara, Yusuf Dantsoho Memorial Hospital Kaduna, Ondo State Ministry of Health, Chukwuemeka Odumegwu Ojukwu University Teaching Hospital Anambra Laboratory, Dr. Lawrence Henshaw Memorial Hospital Calabar Laboratory, International Organization for Migration (IOM) FCT Laboratory and Ogun State Ministry of Health with laboratory consumables and personal protective equipment (PPE)
- Supported Abia, Akwa Ibom, Cross River and Kano State Ministry of Health (SMoH), National Hospital, Abuja as well as the 36 NYSC Camp sites and Federal Capital Territory (FCT) with RDT kits for increase COVID-19 testing
- Concluded distribution of COVID-19 commodities to Ondo and Yobe States and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT) treatment centers
- Concluded One Health Risk Communication Training of Public Health Professionals and the Media
- Conducted a five-day learning visit to understudy opportunities for community listening in Kano
- Facilitated media appearances on COVID-19 in the week under review
- Conducted infodemic management capacity need assessment for national risk communication stakeholders
- Conducted training of State Health Educators on social listening and community polling
- Held meeting to review COVID-19 guideline for the upcoming safe school reopening conference
- Ongoing promotion of COVID-19 messages on testing, signs and symptoms, location of testing facilities, price of testing, and location of vaccination sites
- Supported Federal Capital Territory Administration (FCTA) to train FCT quarantine facility staff
- Continued support to National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA) in COVID-19 vaccination campaign
- Developed/mapped out strategic pillar activities to sustain the response
- Continued engagement with states to ensure regular reporting and response continuity
- Continued roll out of Ag-RDT in collaboration with partners
- Continued tracking and collation of data from states for strategic coordination
- Continued collation of reports on COVID-19 clinical management study
- Ongoing COVID-19 vaccine effectiveness study in collaboration with National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA) and WHO
- Ongoing study on knowledge and compliance of health care workers to infection prevention and control (IPC) measures in the control of COVID-19 infection

- Ongoing research on drivers of mortality prognostic factors and other health sector challenges associated with COVID-19 deaths in treatment centres in Abia, Delta, Edo, FCT, Kaduna, Kano, Lagos, Niger, Ogun, Oyo, Plateau, Rivers, & Yobe States
- Continued follow up with states for daily reporting, contact tracing and key challenges
- Ongoing enhanced surveillance at points of entry
- Ongoing review of IPC guidelines on management of suspected and confirmed cases of COVID-19
- Ongoing online classes for IPC Intermediate diploma course for IPC professionals
- Continued sensitisation of schools, hospitals, patients and relations and religious bodies on hand hygiene
- Conducted Ag-RDT screening for members of staff of the Federal Ministry of Women Affairs and Federal Ministry of Mines and Steel Development
- Ongoing sequencing of positive samples among travellers to Nigeria and positive cases detected incountry, at the National Reference Laboratory (NRL), Gaduwa
- Ongoing quarterly commodity monitoring and stock verification exercise to reconcile data across states, check available stock balance and utilisation records
- Ongoing prepositioning of PPE and commodities at the sub-national level for labs, treatment centres, sample collection centres and other relevant facilities as preparedness for surge in cases
- Ongoing media appearances on radio and television
