
#### DATA AS REPORTED AND ACCURATE BY NCDC AS AT MIDNIGHT 8TH JULY 2020

## **HIGHLIGHTS**

- Four hundred and sixty (460) confirmed cases were reported in the last 24 hours from 21 states Lagos (150), Rivers (49), Oyo (43), Delta (38), FCT (26), Anambra (20), Kano (20), Plateau (18), Edo (14), Bayelsa (13), Enugu (13), Osun (12), Kwara (10), Borno (8), Ogun (7), Kaduna (6), Imo (4), Bauchi (3), Gombe (3), Niger (2) and Adamawa (1).
- Two hundred and sixty-five (265) cases were discharged in the last 24 hours in 14 states Ebonyi (71), Delta (47), Rivers (40), Edo (30), Bauchi (12), Ogun (11), Lagos (10), Sokoto (10), Kaduna (9), FCT (8), Gombe (7), Borno (5), Bayelsa (4) and Enugu (1).
- Fifteen (15) deaths were recorded in the last 24 hours in eight states
   Delta (6), Edo (3), Bauchi (1), Bayelsa (1), Borno (1), Enugu (1), Ogun (1) and Rivers (1).
- All 36 states in Nigeria, and the FCT, have reported a confirmed case.

Figure 2: Daily Epidemic Curve of Confirmed Cases (WK9 - WK28)





Figure 3: Age-Sex Distribution of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK28)



## **PREPAREDNESS**

Since the confirmation of the first case on 27<sup>th</sup> February 2020, the NCDC has released advisories and statements to help Nigerians and affected groups in particular to respond to the pandemic

- Ahead of forthcoming elections in the country, NCDC has issued <u>Guidelines for Conducting</u> <u>Elections During the COVID-19 Outbreak in Nigeria</u>.
- To protect our elders, and those with pre-existing medical conditions, NCDC has issued an *Advisory for Vulnerable Groups*.
- NCDC has released <u>quidelines on the re-opening of places for worship</u>.
- The Nigeria Police Force has released COVID-19 operational guidelines for the <u>Police and other</u> <u>Law Enforcement Agencies</u> in Nigeria
- NCDC and the Department of Hospital Services (Federal Ministry of Health) have updated the <u>case management guidelines</u> (version 3) with reviewed changes such as the discharge criteria and medication being used for the treatment of cases
- Guidelines have been issued for the <u>safe transportation of remains of persons suspected or confirmed to have died of COVID-19</u>
- Information on diagnostics of the COVID-19 virus can be found in our <u>detailed FAQ document</u>.
- To increase our testing capacity, NCDC has issued guidelines for the integration of private labs.
- Guidelines for <u>businesses and employers</u> have been updated.
- NCDC has updated its <u>case definition</u>, <u>community case definition</u> and <u>case management guide</u>.
- NCDC releases periodic *public health advisories* to Nigerians on the COVID-19 disease.
- To adhere to post-lockdown measures, NCDC has released an <u>advisory on the use of face masks</u>, as well as information on the <u>Use of Cloth face masks</u> and <u>how to make your cloth face masks</u>.
- NCDC has released guidelines for the <u>management of pregnant women and nursing mothers</u> during the pandemic.
- To address burials of loved ones who die from COVID-19, guidelines have been issued to advise on the <u>management of dead bodies</u>.
- For health centres managing cases, the following documents have been released- a guideline for the <u>Rational Use of Personal Protective Equipment in the care of COVID-19 cases</u>.
- As part of plans to increase the testing capacity of the country, the NCDC published a <u>National</u> Strategy to Scale Up Access to Coronavirus Disease Testing in Nigeria document.
- The Presidential Task Force has published policies and announcements on COVID-19 <u>available on</u>
   <u>the website of the Presidency</u> including presidential addresses, task force updates and
   information on livelihood and economic support.

## **RESPONSE**

On 28<sup>th</sup> February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 – the highest emergency level in Nigeria –led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC).

- Provided guidance and supportive supervision for triaging and hand hygiene compliance in Gombe State
- Setting up of triaging areas in health facilities across Enugu North, Enugu State
- Deployment of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to laboratories within the national network - Plateau, Borno and Rivers States
- Supplied PPE and case management commodities to University of Abuja Teaching Hospital, Gwagwalada (UATH) and National Hospital, Abuja
- Participated in a round table technical meeting with the Honourable Minister of State for Education, State Commissioners for Education and other education stakeholders to assess level of preparedness for schools reopening
- Conducted a strategic meeting with states response coordination teams to strengthen subnational level response

- Deployed an additional Rapid Response Team (RRT) to Imo State
- Finalised the Local Government Areas (LGA) hotspot strategy document
- Implementation planning for the training of state teams on surveillance
- Activated new GeneXpert laboratory in Federal Medical Centre (FMC), Owerri
- Ongoing state level IPC training in Katsina State targeting health care workers at primary and secondary heath facilities
- Ongoing supply of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) commodities to Laboratory networks across four states Abia, Bauchi, Kano and Ondo
- Held a coordination meeting with the Nigeria Governors Forum to strengthen collaboration between states' task force and state social mobilisation committees
