
DATA AS REPORTED AND ACCURATE BY NCDC AS AT MIDNIGHT 9TH JULY 2020

HIGHLIGHTS

- Four hundred and ninety-nine (499) confirmed cases were reported in the last 24 hours from 24 states Lagos (157), Edo (59), Ondo (56), Oyo (31), Akwa Ibom (22), Borno (21), Plateau (19), Kaduna (18), Katsina (18), Bayelsa (17), FCT (17), Delta (14), Kano (11), Rivers (10), Enugu (8), Ogun (6), Kwara (4), Imo (3), Nasarawa (2), Osun (2), Abia (1), Ekiti (1), Niger (1) and Yobe (1).
- One hundred and seventy-three (173) cases were discharged in the last 24 hours in 13 states Abia (47), Ogun (32), Oyo (23), Edo (15), Kaduna (12), FCT (10), Niger (10), Enugu (7), Rivers (7), Kwara (6), Borno (2), Bauchi (1) and Kano (1).
- Five deaths were recorded in the last 24 hours in two states Kwara (3) and Enugu (2)
- All **36** states in Nigeria, and the FCT, have reported a confirmed case.
- <u>eLearning.NCDC.gov.ng</u>, NCDC elearning platform recently published Infection, Prevention and Control (IPC) for COVID-19 course with over 1,552 enrollments 24 hours after launch.





Figure 2: Daily Epidemic Curve of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK28)

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PREPAREDNESS

Since the confirmation of the first case on 27th February 2020, the NCDC has released advisories and statements to help Nigerians and affected groups in particular to respond to the pandemic

- Ahead of forthcoming elections in the country, NCDC has issued <u>Guidelines for Conducting</u> <u>Elections During the COVID-19 Outbreak in Nigeria</u>.
- To protect our elders, and those with pre-existing medical conditions, NCDC has issued an <u>Advisory for Vulnerable Groups</u>.
- NCDC has released <u>quidelines on the re-opening of places for worship</u>.
- The Nigeria Police Force has released COVID-19 operational guidelines for the <u>Police and other</u> <u>Law Enforcement Agencies</u> in Nigeria
- NCDC and the Department of Hospital Services (Federal Ministry of Health) have updated the <u>case management guidelines</u> (version 3) with reviewed changes such as the discharge criteria and medication being used for the treatment of cases
- Guidelines have been issued for the <u>safe transportation of remains of persons suspected or</u> <u>confirmed to have died of COVID-19</u>
- Information on diagnostics of the COVID-19 virus can be found in our *detailed FAQ document*.
- To increase our testing capacity, NCDC has issued guidelines for the *integration of private labs*.
- Guidelines for *businesses and employers* have been updated.
- NCDC has updated its *case definition*, *community case definition* and *case management quide*.
- NCDC releases periodic *public health advisories* to Nigerians on the COVID-19 disease.
- To adhere to post-lockdown measures, NCDC has released an *advisory on the use of face masks*, as well as information on the *Use of Cloth face masks* and *how to make your cloth face masks*.
- NCDC has released guidelines for the <u>management of pregnant women and nursing mothers</u> during the pandemic.
- To address burials of loved ones who die from COVID-19, guidelines have been issued to advise on the *management of dead bodies*.
- For health centres managing cases, the following documents have been released- a guideline for the *Rational Use of Personal Protective Equipment in the care of COVID-19 cases*.
- As part of plans to increase the testing capacity of the country, the NCDC published a <u>National</u> <u>Strategy to Scale Up Access to Coronavirus Disease Testing in Nigeria</u> document.
- The Presidential Task Force has published policies and announcements on COVID-19 <u>available on</u> <u>the website of the Presidency</u> – including presidential addresses, task force updates and information on livelihood and economic support.

RESPONSE

On 28th February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 – the highest emergency level in Nigeria –led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC).

- Participated in the Presidential Task Force on COVID-19 Mid Term Review
- Received a total of 77 Persons of Interest (POIs)/Returnees from India (63) and Cote D'Ivoire (14)
- Cumulatively, 1579 samples have been tested, 1381 negatives, 83 positives and 114 pending in FCT
- Conducted implementation planning meeting for Training of Trainers (TOT) for state teams
- Conducted training for 30 members of the Imo State IPC committee
- Ongoing orientation of leadership of private health care facilities on IPC best practices and minimum standards in Imo State
- Supply of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to laboratories within the national network in Oyo State
- Supplied laboratory materials for the activation of the GeneXpert testing laboratory at the University of Abuja Teaching Hospital, Gwagwalada
- Completed data collection for First Few Cases (FFX) Study in the FCT

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- Finalised the completion of three manuscripts and made ready for submission
- Ongoing development of full-scale risk assessment tools for school reopening
- Provided guidance and supportive supervision for triaging and hand hygiene compliance in Gombe State
- Setting up of triaging areas in health facilities across Enugu North, Enugu State
- Deployment of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to laboratories within the national network Plateau, Borno and Rivers States
- Supplied PPE and case management commodities to University of Abuja Teaching Hospital, Gwagwalada (UATH) and National Hospital, Abuja
- Participated in a round table technical meeting with the Honourable Minister of State for Education, State Commissioners for Education and other education stakeholders to assess level of preparedness for school reopening
