
DATA AS REPORTED AND ACCURATE BY NCDC by Midnight 2nd June 2020

HIGHLIGHTS

- Two hundred and forty-one (241) confirmed cases were reported in the last 24 hours in fourteen (14) states Lagos (142), Oyo (15), FCT (13), Kano (12), Edo (11), Delta (10), Kaduna (9), Rivers (9), Borno (8), Jigawa (4), Gombe (3), Plateau (3), Bauchi (1) and Osun (1).
- No new state recorded a confirmed COVID-19 case in the last 24 hours. The total number of states including FCT that have reported at least one confirmed case in Nigeria is still 36 (35 states + FCT).
- One hundred and seventeen (117) cases were discharged in the last 24 hours in eleven (11) states Kano (46), Lagos (33), Edo (8), Borno (7), Delta (6), Kaduna (5), Rivers (5), Jigawa (3), FCT (2), Bauchi (1) and Sokoto (1)
- Fifteen (15) deaths were recorded in the last 24 hours in three (3) states Lagos (12), Rivers (2) and Edo (1)




Figure 2: Cummalative Epi-curve of COVID-19 cases in Nigeria as at June 1st 2020

There are many individuals involved in the COVID-19 pandemic response in Nigeria. NCDC has deployed over **440** people to support **34** states and the FCT through our Rapid Response Teams (RRTs) and trained over **13,000** healthcare workers on Infection, Prevention and Control across the Federation. These include technicians, ad-hoc staff such as sample collectors, contact tracers and cleaners at the health care facilities. This response comes with great risk especially for those on the frontline – **812** healthcare workers have been infected in the course of the response, including **29** NCDC staff.

Figure 3: Daily Epidemic Curve of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK23)





Figure 4: Age-Sex Distribution of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK23)



PREPAREDNESS

Since the confirmation of the first case on 27th February 2020, the NCDC has released advisories and statements to help Nigerians and affected groups in particular to respond to the pandemic

- Information on diagnostics of the COVID-19 virus can be found in our detailed FAQ document
- To increase our testing capacity, NCDC has issued guidelines for the *integration of private labs*.
- Guidelines for <u>businesses and employers</u> have been updated
- NCDC has updated its <u>case definition</u>, <u>community case definition</u> and <u>case management guide</u>.
- Ahead of the Ramadan fasting period, an <u>Advisory for Ramadan</u> has been issued.
- NCDC releases periodic *public health advisories* to Nigerians on the COVID-19 disease.
- To adhere to post-lockdown measures, NCDC has released an <u>advisory on the use of face masks</u>, as well as information on the <u>Use of Cloth face masks</u> and <u>how to make your cloth face masks</u>.
- NCDC has released guidelines for the <u>management of pregnant women and nursing mothers</u> during the pandemic.
- To address burials of loved ones who die from COVID-19, guidelines have been issued to advise on the *management of dead bodies*.
- NCDC has released a <u>Self-Isolation and Quarantine Guide</u> and <u>Mandatory institutional quideline</u> <u>for returnees to Nigeria</u> to help those who are exposed to COVID-19 confirmed cases or returnees to Nigeria.
- For health centres managing cases, the following documents have been released- a guideline for the *Rational Use of Personal Protective Equipment in the care of COVID-19 cases*.
- As part of plans to increase the testing capacity of the country, the NCDC published a <u>National</u> <u>Strategy to Scale Up Access to Coronavirus Disease Testing in Nigeria</u> document.
- The Presidential Task Force has published policies and announcements on COVID-19 <u>available on</u>
 <u>the website of the Presidency</u> including presidential addresses, task force updates and
 information on livelihood and economic support.

RESPONSE

On 28th February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 – the highest emergency level in Nigeria –led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC).

- Engaged states on scaling up sample collection
- Developed data-driven intervention plans for Bauchi due to the increasing number of Healthcare worker Infection.
- Trained additional 15 Healthcare workers on IPC in Borno
- Ongoing onsite sample collection training in Ondo and Benue states
- Engaged the 36 State Logistics Management Coordination Units to share logistics service data
- Official visit by the Presidential Task Force (PTF) to Lagos state
- Trained 40 community Pharmacists and members of Civil Society Organisations on Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) in Kano state
- Conducted Infection Prevention and Control training of trainers for Local Government Areas (LGAs) officers in Osun state with plans to cascade training at community level
- Supported 36 States and FCT with Information, Education and Communication (IEC) materials
- Produced 150 jingles in different languages. Ongoing airing of COVID-19 jingles on radio in 16 States
- Deployed response materials and supplies to University of Abuja Teaching Hospital, Gwagwalada
- Updated clinical data on the Surveillance and Outbreak Response Management and Analysis System (SORMAS) platform
- Conducted training on safe sample collection with participants from all 33 Local Government Areas (LGAs) to drive community testing in Oyo state.
